




Labeling Your Quilt Show Entry

Every item entered in the quilt show **MUST** have an entry label placed on the lower left of the back side of the quilt. The label should be a piece of fabric, and with a permanent marking pen include the following information: Quilts Show Entry Number, Name, Address, Phone number. Sew this label on with a whip stitch. Please do **NOT** use tape or safety pins! If you are having the quilt judged,


your name, address, and phone number must be covered – **ONLY** the entry number can show.

You may either whip stitch a piece of fabric over the personal info, or place masking tape over it. I personally like to use a piece of fabric approximately 6 inches by 9 to 12 inches. I write the entry number at the top and my name, address and phone number at the bottom. Then I fold it in thirds, with the

top third showing the number over the bottom third that has the personal info and then stitch it on. For example:



The placement on the quilt should look like:

What is your proudest quilting accomplishment?


I was thrilled to win Best First Bed quilt, my first blue ribbon, in 2002.



SHHHH! It's a Secret

Please make a special block for our President, Kathy Havranek, to show her how you appreciate all her hard work for you this year. Bring or send it to the May meeting and place in the basket at the Membership table.

Signature Block for Kathy



Please use shades of TAUPE for this block with the lightest or unbleached muslin in the center. Sign the center with an acid-free permanent marker. Signing is easiest if you iron the fabric to freezer paper to stabilize it before writing on it. Remove the paper before assembling the block.

Block finished size is 8" X 8" (8-1/2" X 8-1/2" with seam allowances).

Cut corner square fabrics 2-7/8", mark a line on the diagonal, stitch 1/4" on each side of the line, and cut apart on the line to create 2 half-square triangles. Repeat for second set. With seam allowances they must measure 2-1/2" X 2-1/2".

Cut dark rectangles 2-1/2" X 4-1/2".

Cut top and bottom center rectangles 1-3/4" X 4-1/2".

Cut center signature rectangle 2" X 4-1/2".

Assemble as shown.

the Children's Emergency Fund for a donation from her employer and she got a \$500.00 contribution for next year.

Terri Caffrey reported that the NQA membership has been purchased. Quilt Show 2010 will be advertised through their website.

Rita Mathews reported that Helping hands has been going to the Care Center in Elkhorn. They are teaching some of the residents to sew. Some of the residents know how to quilt, others are progressing well.

CJ Gleason reported that the block for next month will be

the sail boat block.

La Vonne Dunetts reported that the 2011 Quilt Show contract has been signed, and will be held, for the second year, at the La Vista Conference Center on June 23rd, 24th, & 25th. 2011.

Andi Chakravarti reported that an evaluation of the quilt frames and any signs will be done to evaluate advertising needs for the 2010 Quilt Show.

Dee Acklie was able to collect 59 blankets for the children in Haiti. They will be delivered later this month.

De Anne Mack reported that the 2010-11 membership form is complete and available online for members to use.

A discussion took place about the price of the tickets for the Opportunity Quilt next year.

They all had beautiful examples of what they had learned in Ann's class. Ann's presentation was fascinating as she showed us how painting can add another important dimension to our quilts.

The March minutes were approved as printed in the newsletter.

Chris Stewart from the Respite Resource Center Coalition thanked members for their contributions to quilts made for caregivers from the agency. Through Helping Hands, 21 quilts will be awarded to caregivers at the Respite Centers' annual "Food for the Soul" celebration held on April 21st. This event celebrates caregivers and recognizes the many chal-

lenges they face. Chris shared with us how delighted they are to receive our quilts, specially made for them.

Kathy Havranek asked the members of Helping Hands to stand as she read two notes of thanks to the guild. The first was from the Life Care Center of Elkhorn recognizing Angie Reed and thanking Helping Hands for their activities with the residents. The second was from the College of Saint Mary, also thanking members for the gift of quilts presented to them by Helping Hands.

Thanks were given to Elizabeth Kannedy, who nominated the Children's Emergency Fund as a deserving charity with her employer. OQG was presented with a check for \$500.00 for the CEF cause. Roberta Willet now has serious competition for the "Shameless" Award for 2010.

President Elect, LaVonne Dunetts, asked if there were any additional nominations from the floor for candidates for OQG officers for 2010-11.

She did so by each office. There were no additional nominations. Then Jane Fiala made a motion for acclamation. Roberta Willet seconded the motion. The members voted on and approved the motion. The new officers for 2010-2011 are:

Teri Quinn reported that the fundraiser, "The Gathering" raised \$163,000.00 for Sacred Hearts School. This amount was due to the 40 pillows and 10 quilts provided by OQG. Teri thanked everyone for their work on the project.

Angie Reed reported that Helping Hands is sponsoring a contest for the May meeting: Bring at least one yard of fabric from your stash, and pick out a yard of fabric someone else has brought. At the October 2010 meeting, bring back a quilt you have made from the fabric you chose.

DeAnne Mack announced there were 4 new members and 2 guests. She reminded us to send the thank you cards to our generous door-prize suppliers.

Memberships are now being accepted for next year both on-line and at the meeting.

Sandy Philgren reported that Quilts of Valor had 3 quilts, and one top turned in tonight as well as numerous blocks. They will be sewing the 3rd Saturday in May at the Hospice House.

Cindy Erickson is still in need of blocks for the Munroe Meyer quilt. Jan Fry asked that members continue to make small quilts (24" to 48" square) for the UNMC neo natal intensive care unit. They are greatly appreciated.

The Quest for Cancer wants brightly colored pillow cases. The pattern for the Hot Dog Pillow Case will be in the May newsletter.

Susie Jarosz asked members to contact her to discuss interest in having a booth at the Quilt Show where members can sell items they have made.

Susie also reported that there are 177 entries in the 2010 Quilt Show. Susie

reminded members that quilts must be turned in May 11-25. They may be dropped off at the next meeting or at the shops listed on the website. The Members only evening will be Thursday, June 17, 2010. Please remember to sign up to volunteer to work the show.

Cindy Erickson used President, Kathy Havranek, as the model quilt to demonstrate the proper way to label quilts for the show. Directions are also on the website.

Cindy also announced that Linda McCuean, the judge for our 2010 Quilt Show, will be teaching classes. Linda will teach "So you Want to Design a Whole Quilt". The cost will be

\$40.00 at the Bernina Store. Linda will also offer lecture and demo classes for long arm quilters. The morning will be for beginners and the afternoon will be for experienced long arm quilters. Check the website for details or contact Cindy.

Rojene, CJ and Denvia awarded four sets of blocks from the Block of The Month.

Show & Tell followed. The meeting adjourned at 9:27 PM.

International Quilt Study Center & Museum


Quilts Under the Microscope, running April 2 - August 1, 2010. This "whodunit" exposes the many agents, both natural and human-made, that can slowly (or quickly!) destroy our quilts and other heirloom textiles.

The exhibition presents a group of carefully studied quilts that divulge some of the secrets of their past and help determine the best way to safeguard them for the future. Institutions like the International Quilt Study Center use science and technical analysis to discover the history of objects and to inform the museum's activities of preservation, interpretation, and display. These important artifacts can represent the history of a person, a family, a community,

or a country. Preserving them is one way to maintain an important link to the past. Visitors learn how to care for their families' valued quilts and textiles in their own homes, to ensure these heirlooms survive well into the future.

South Asian Seams: Quilts from India, Pakistan, & Bangladesh (5/15/10 - 11/7/10) will consist of more than 40 examples of *ralli* and *kantha*. It will also feature a rich assortment of large-scale photographs depicting the women who make these quilts. Narrating and illustrating the lives of these women is a vital component of the exhibition's story-line.
