To date, over 4,000 quilts have been presented to families of the fallen.

When I think about quilt shows, I feel just like a kid at Christmas. And just like a kid, I'm counting down the days until we throw open the doors of the ballroom and reveal the beauty waiting inside. What kind of quilt magic have you been working on through the cold, quiet months? Who will win Best of Show? Whose use of color and design will inspire me to stretch and grow as a quilter? Who will challenge my notions of what makes a great quilt? What beautiful things will I see that will fuel my imagination and my work through the next year?

I know a lot of you are just like me and love our annual show. If you haven't got quite this same frenzied passion for this special event, Betty, Karen and I challenge you to get more involved and see if your perceptions don't change.

We can't have a quilt show without entries and the time has come to enter your quilts. The entry form is available on the guild website: www.omahaquiltersguild.org. If vou're not comfortable with the electronic form, please call me and I will help you with your entries. I work from 9-3 but am generally home late afternoons and evenings. I'm here to help you if you need or want assistance. Remember that the entry deadline is the April meeting of guild, Tuesday, April 12th.

At the May 10th meeting, we will need you to verify your show entry descriptions and pick up your entry numbers (entry numbers will also be available on line after May 10th). You will need to have that number to label your quilt for the show. Cindy will lead us all in a favorite guild activity in May, the annual labeling dance.

We hope that you will have your work judged. This is one of the biggest perks of your membership in the guild. Our shows are always judged by certified judges artworks in prestigious public and private collections and has his quilts appear in numerous publications including American Quilter, Quilters newsletter Magazine, Quiltmaker, Quilting Quarterly and great Americans Quilts. Scott is an NQA Certified Quilt Judge who has judged throughout the country, including American

Appropriate for advanced beginners or intermediate students."

as you check out the fabrics imported from other countries.

There will be no shortage of books and patterns. Some of the vendors will be bringing books that they themselves have written or have been written by someone local to their home locations. Block Exchange - Wheel of Fortune

Did you see all the beautiful Card Tricks that were turned in? Every month there are such wonderful blocks made...and given away. Vanessa Kumov and Mary Schmitler won the start of a great scrappy quilt. Congratulations.

Don't forget to make the Wheel of Fortune block to turn in at the April meeting. This is a challenging block. It lends itself to lots of color placement choices and did you see the big blank center square? Anything could fit in that space.

Drop by our table to check out all the samples of the Wheel of Fortune block and pick up the applique pattern for the final offering for the year. We chose a simple shape that's familiar to all of us. Use any applique technique that you like best. We'll have our samples on display as usual.

12¹/₂" unfinished (12" finished)

We have given you a focus fabric (FF) to put in the four corners of Wheel of Fortune. Choose four other fabrics to complete this block. Have a little fun with the center square. You'll get the illusion of a circle without the trouble of sewing curves.



Traditional Cutting Instructions:

Focus Fabric

2 - 3." squares, layer atop Fabric 1 matching squares

Fabric 1

2 - 3." squares (match with FF for half-square triangles)

- 1– 4¹/₄" square, cut diagonally twice for quarter square triangles
- 4 2." squares, layer with Fabric 2 matching squares
- 8 2" squares

Fabric 2

2 - 3." squares, cut diagonally once

 $2 - 4\frac{1}{4}$ " squares, cut diagonally twice for quarter square trian-

gles

Fabric 3

 $1 - 4\frac{1}{4}$ " squares, cut diagonally twice for quarter square triangles

4-2" squares

Fabric 4

 $1 - 6^{1/2}$ " square

Using a specialized ruler to cut triangles? Here are your cutting instructions:

Focus Fabric (FF)

 $4 - 3\frac{1}{2}$ " half square triangles

Fabric 1

- $4 3\frac{1}{2}$ " half square triangles
- $4 3\frac{1}{2}$ " quarter square triangles
- 8-2" half square triangles
- 8-2" squares

Fabric 3

 $4 - 3\frac{1}{2}$ " quarter square triangles 4 - 2" squares

Fabric 4

$1 - 6\frac{1}{2}$ " square

On the wrong side of the squares draw diagonal lines as required – once for half square triangles. Layer the half square unit fabrics atop each other and sew ¹/₄" on each side of drawn line. Cut apart on drawn line

and you will have magically made 2 half square units The squares intended for quarter square units should be cut apart diagonally. Use an acrylic ruler and rotary cutter for these.

Once you've got your pieces cut, lay them out so you can see how the block goes together.

This is the perfect block for your cat to leap upon and scatter to the wind and ceiling fans can be a menace.

Start by laying the Fabric 3 2" squares on the corners of the Fabric 4 center square. You want to "nip" the corners. Sew on the diagonal line. Flip the corner out to check you've still got a square. Trim the seam carefully.

Sew all the smallest pieces together first and keep building towards larger units. Sew the quarter square units together and attach the small rectangles to each side. Sew the block into three rows. (The center row will be wider than the top and bottom rows.)

Press gently all along the way. Are you ready to spin your Wheel of Fortune?

OQG Board Meeting Minutes February 15, 2011

The meeting was called to order by President LaVonne Dunetts at 7:05 p.m. She thanked everyone for coming on a previously unscheduled evening. The board had been unable to meet as scheduled in January and February due in inclement weather.

Historian Lorraine Fitzgerald expressed concern about the safe storage of the large scrapbooks and 10 binders containing the Guild's history that she has compiled and documented. The possibility of housing these materials at the International Quilt Study Center in Lincoln, the Douglas County Historical Society, the Mormon Trails Center, or some other facility were discussed and will be looked into.

Block of the Month Denvia Capozio has received positive feedback from guild members about the variety of techniques used in the blocks this year. The instructions for the current block, card trick, are on website. Next month's block will feature appliqué.

Quilt Show Jan Fry's committee met for the first time on the 12th. Bookmarks with show information on one side and guild information on the other and posters have been printed. Vendor applications have been received. A class taught by the show judge will be held on Wednesday, June 22, Lavonne Dunetts has kits for the silent auction. There will be a reserve on everything in the auction with starting and minimum bid increases.

Spring Fling Retreat Jan Fry reported that everything is ready for this year's retreat. Next year, the retreat will be on February 10, 11. and 12. The February 2012 retreat will be on the 14th. The possibility of a conflict between a speaker's classes and the retreat was discussed and the retreat schedule might changed if necessary.

Webmaster Roberta Willet received a suggestion from Denise O'Toole to add show and tell to the web. Denise's quilts are the first to be displayed. Colleen Wise's profile has been updated and information about her workshops in March are on the web. Photo album records show that 8 people from around the world are following our webpage. Michelle Craig has opened a Facebook page for the Guild

Community Quilts Mary Cave reported that Ellen Murphy purchased a quilt for \$110 in January that had been made for Emergency Pregnancy Services. Several finished quilts have been turned in to her committee. Any information about a quilt donated to the Lutheran Church of the Master from the guild would be appreciated.

Helping Hands Rita Haverman reported that the respite caregiver dinner will be on April 20. Last year, 30 wheel chair or lap quilts were given to the families. Angie Reed has set a goal of 50 this year. Several guild members attended last year and guild members are invited to attend again this year.

Treasurer Terri Caffrey reported the guild will be giving 3 \$25 dollar awards at the 2011 State Fair including the Quilting Bee Award for the best

group quilt. Payment for the storage unit is due and yearly or monthly payments were discussed. The tax return has been completed and signed. The \$900 accountants fee and the \$1000 storage fee will be paid this spring. The cost of the \$400 rental and \$15.50 per person for food plus gratuity and tax for the annual Holiday Party was discussed and it was decided to raise the cost of the dinner to \$18.00 per member.

Dee Acklie reported that applications for the fall retreat will be in the March newsletter. The tax rate went up this year which will raise the rates. Camp Joy Holling is switching to 2 year contracts. This is Dee Acklie's and LeAnn Killion's last year to chair this committee.

Golden Thimble Award Dee Acklie and Carol McCann presented the recommendations they have made with Jane Fiala for an annual award honoring a current guild member who has shown outstanding leadership in at least one off these areas: leadership, community outreach or service in the name of OQG, and/or contribution to the quilting community.

Nominations can only be made by an OQG member. Nominees must be OQG members. Nominations will be submitted each spring by April 15 to the selection committee. Calls for nominations will appear in the March newsletter and on the OOG website.

The final selection committee will be made up of 3 past presidents. The award will be given based on merit, not as a popularity contest or the greatest nominations. number of Awards will be given at the May meeting. More than 1 person may be considered as deserving the award each year. It is up to the committee to set the number of awards to be given each year up to 3 awards. A nominee who does not receive the award my be renominated the following year. Submissions will not be carried over from year to year. Only the winners name will be announced.

Forming a past president's group to sponsor the award was discussed.

This committee is proceeding by consensus.

Programs Carol McCann, speaking for Vicki Hoskovic, reported that we will have a local speaker in October. Roxanne O'Hare will be here in November to lecture and teach a 2 day class in mixed media fabric collage.

The rising cost of speaker fees, facility rental, and other expenses were discussed along with the possibility of raising vearly dues. To continue as a first class quilt guild, we need first class programs. Many speakers receive \$1,000 per lecture. The discussion was tabled.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:38 pm.

Betty Harmsen reviewed the challenge quilt requirements:

- * Size: between 8 * 10 and 9 * 12
- * orange fabric and animal print
- * Journey theme with explanation of journey written on paper.

Cindy Erickson said that kit and block of the month quilts which included the pattern and fabric when purchased have their own category in the show for the first time. The Best of Show quilt must be quilted by an OOG member.

Becky Draper is trying to contact four members who won a prize at the December meeting and the member who won a Jim Shore scarecrow that had been broken. Please contact Becky if you have not received your prize.

Denvia Capozio and Mary Schnitker distributed 2 sets of card trick blocks. They also have blocks from previous months to give to those winners. Next month's block is the wheel of fortune.

Malinda Armstrong, an OOG and Braided River Guild member told us about Don Bell from California who has started the Home of the Brave Project for fallen heroes of Iran and Iraq. Each family receives a 48 * 84 quilt. Bell is coming to the Braided River Guild in April. Seams to Be will hold a workshop on April 28 for \$20. His other project is the Fallen Heroes National Quilt. A pot holder block is made for every fallen soldier. Nebraska has 68 to be made. Braided River is having a workshop for \$25 which includes lunch. Jan Fry stepped forward and announced that she will organize the completion of blocks for the men from Douglas County.

Pat Stava of the membership committee announced that 128 members were present, with one new member and 6 guests. Door prizes were awarded.

The business meeting was adjourned by Susie Jarosz at 9:06 pm and show and tell concluded the evening.
