working from very simple to pretty complex pieced borders, all of which will frame and enhance your work incredibly.

Ms. Hall has lectured and taught quiltmaking for guilds and quilt conferences in the United States and abroad for twenty-five years. She is an author and quilt designer as well as a teacher, judge, and appraiser for antique and contemporary quilts.

Her award-winning quilts have been exhibited nationally and internationally in quilt shows, juried fiber and multi-media exhibitions, and galleries. Her quilts are included in public and private collections and in the American Quilter's Society Museum in Paducah, KY. She has a particular interest in foundation work, and has explored methods for using foundation techniques in all kinds of piecing, traditional, innovative, as well as designs not usually considered for foundation piecing.

Jane is intrigued by the interaction of colors in fabrics and the graphics of quilt designs, especially the geometry of patterns such as Mariner's Compasses, Log Cabins and Pineapples. She works most often with traditional patterns using innovative sets and coloration, taking a fresh approach to the designs. The Chroma series of Pineapple colorwash designs is among her most recent work.

Pineapples Plus

This graphic design has so many possibilities, it is hard to know where to start, but we do begin at the beginning with one classic Pineapple block, pieced on a vellum foundation.

The pattern has been computergenerated, and is accurate and easy to see and sew on. Sewing with strips, upside-down or on the back of the pattern, may be new to some, so everyone makes one practice block. Then on to whatever design you fancy.

The choices are two kinds of offcenter patterns, a Flying Geese pattern, or playing with the classic block to create new designs.

Pineapples are so versatile, there is always one more just waiting to be made, and it's my hope that you will become enamored of them too.

When Whitehouse Steps Log Cabin blocks are cut apart at the same angles for each block, and the segments then recombined, a wonderful mélange of colors and shapes appears. The classic pattern morphs into an entirely new graphic with unpredictable shapes, highlights, even transparencies.

Since this requires a minimum of 16 blocks, better yet 20 or 25, we'll spend some time designing with paper patterns, and then start making blocks with fabrics. This is a great way to use your stash of strips and scraps!

Crazy Patch Pattern for September 2012



You will need an assortment of red, white, blue pieces. 1- Foundation piece of muslin or scrap of fabric, 13" square.

Let's start------

Make an uneven five sided piece of fabric any color, about 4 inches across. Place this piece on your foundation right side up, lay another color fabric on top of this wrong side up, and sew a seam. Flip and press. Trim off any extra fabric. Do not cut foundation fabric.

Using your favorite fancy stitches on your machine (zigzag, flowers, and satin stitches) cover your seams. Add another strip to the adjacent side, flip and press. Cover your seams with a different stitch or the same stitch.

Continue in this manner until you have covered the entire foundation piece.

Trim to 12 1/2" square.

July 17, 2012

Board Meeting Minutes

President Corinne Mittag opened the meeting at 7:00 pm. Attendees: Corinne Mittag, Linda Holman, Denise Shroyer, Jan Fry, Carol McCann, Jeanette Podwinski, Elaine Seier, Andrea Chakravarti, Andy Laugel, Angie Reed, Kathy Havranek, Carla Toczek, Judy Sellers, Betty Harmsen, Connie Pratt, Roberta Willet, Brenda Reid, Cheri Vossberg, Pat Sears, Cindy Erickson, and Jan Mitchell.

Minutes from the May 1, 2012 meeting were approved as submitted.

Treasurer, Denise Shroyer reported that next year's budget report will be presented in a more member friendly format.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Judy Sellers reported Programs: that she has booked the programs for the next two years. She has been communicating with the Lincoln Guild Program Chairman in coordinating to share a speaker, as would cut costs for both quilds. Jan Hall, the September lecturer has 15 spaces to fill for her Sliced Steps workshop. For the May meeting, she is planning to have a Sewing Bee, where 15 members would show how to do different kinds of handwork. The suggestion was made to have bookmarks printed with all the programs listed.

Corresponding Secretary: Jan Mitchell had nothing to report.

Quilt Show: Jan Fry reported that they received many wonderful comments. There were over 2,000 attendees; and Saturday proved to be the slower day. The value and expenses of having two adjacent rooms didn't prove to be effective: maybe next year we will use just one room. Income was over \$14,000.. The auction had 30 items, with bids that were lower than expected, but brought in \$874.. Next year's show still needs a chairman, and will be held from June 20th thru June 22nd.

Block Exchange: Jeanette Podwinski is ready to for the September guild meeting.

Bus Trip: Jan Fry reported that they are half full.

Spring Fling: Denise O'Toole and Mary Schnitker not present, and nothing to report.

Camp Wannamakablankie: Cheri Vossberg reported that there were 60 signed up, with 5 unpaid registrations. The reason for submitting the reservations early was to inform the camp 60 days ahead if committed or cancelled. A signed contract to Camp Carol Joy Holling needs to be located and sent to them, with deposit if needed.

Children's' Emergency Fund: Pat Sears reported that she has found a stripe fabric to use for the stockings.

Community Connections: Mary Cave reported that a quilt is being prepared for a church to raffle. Also, the Jenny Edmundson Hospital, in Council Bluffs that deals with cancer treatment, has requested a quilt for Voices of Children.

Helping Hands: Angie Reed reported that they are in need of 2.5

inch strips of fabric to make string quilts for boys and girls.

Holiday Party: Carol McCann reported that the contract has been signed to use the German American Society for this next year. The ticket cost will be \$20. Per person, and guests are welcome. We would like to aim to have 300 attend.

Librarian: Tania Uren, not present, but has purchased some new books.

The idea was to find a way to focus on one of the ways our membership reaches out to our community and highlight and support the effort.

We will be doing this each month. The newsletter will tell you about the group and will suggest how you can support the project.

September's spotlight will focus on our **Quilts of Valor and Home of the Brave** groups.

The QoV and HoB need fabric for the quilts they make. Look through your stash for pieces of red, white and blue fabric and then bring it to the September meeting.

Your red, white and blue fabric can then be added to other members' fabric. The end result will be another quilt, or two, or three that the Quilts of Valor and Home of the Brave can give to those who have served in our armed forces.

At this time, OQG is accepting only Album Blocks for the Home of the Brave Quilt Project. Contact Melinda Armstrong, Eastern Nebraska Coordinator, Home of the Brave Quilt Project. A Quilt of Valor made by Tania Uram was awarded during the Nebraska Quilt Guild quilt show to an Afghanistan vet at Cabelas. He also works at Cabelas. He was very pleased to receive this acknowledgement of his service and sacrifice.





What is the Home of the Brave Quilt Project?

Throughout its history, the United States has remembered its military heroes. The Home of the Brave Quilt Project was started to continue that proud tradition. It is a nationwide movement dedicated to honoring our fallen heroes of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan by making and presenting hand made quilts to a Fallen Soldiers family. We use

the quilts to honor and show our gratitude for their soldier's service and provide a measure of comfort to their families. We honor our living Soldiers with Quilts of Valor and our fallen Soldiers family with a Home of the Brave "Soldiers Quilt."

We've taken our inspiration from quilts made during the Civil War. During the Civil War, a volunteer organization called the U.S. Sanitary Commission was formed with the purpose of raising funds and gathering supplies, as well as overseeing the sanitary conditions of the military hospitals. The Women's Auxiliary of the U.S. Sanitary Commission was particularly important in making and donating clothes, bandages and quilts. All donated supplies were stamped "U.S. Sanitary Commission" on the back and documented in the Commission's records.

In 1861 a general call went out for the donation of quilts and coverlets for soldiers. The Sanitary Commission requested that the quilts measure 48 by 84 inches, as these quilts were given to soldiers to carry as part of their bed rolls and were used in military hospitals on the cots of wounded soldiers. In 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ years, the Women's Auxiliary made and donated over 250,000 quilts. They frequently carried the names of the makers and messages of hope and support.

Of these quilts, only seven are known to exist today. Quilts were lost because of the wear and tear from use during military campaigns, others were burned when field hospitals were moved, and many soldiers were buried wrapped in their quilts. Only one of these quilts is currently on public display, it is at the A.K. Smiley Library, Lincoln Memorial Shrine in Redlands, California. We have fashioned our Replica Civil War U.S. Sanitary Commission quilt on this Album Quilt.

The Home of the Brave Quilt Project is a grassroots movement. While some donations have been received, each quilt is made with supplies donated by the maker or quilt guild. Each area or state coordinator sustains their cost out of their own resources. Because it is a genuine grassroots movement, this quilt project has struck a national cord, receiving recognition by many military and political figures as well as noted quilt institution.

There have been 6,333 Fallen Heroes since March 20th 2003, the beginning of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

The State of Nebraska has lost 70 of their Children, 67 men and 3 women that have given their life for our country and our state.

The home of the Brave Quilt project has given 4,370 quilts to 3,683 families.

Hugs and Prayers are hard to hang on to, a quilt is not".
