'Falling' for our November Program

Busy Women Quilt Patterns

Reeze Hanson of Morning Glory Designs, her pattern business, lives in Ottawa, Kansas. Ms Hanson designs "Busy Women Quilt Patterns," that is, patterns that *look* difficult but are really easy. She started teaching beginning quilt classes and realized that most quilt blocks are not difficult to make but the patterns are difficult to figure out. So she started writing patterns that are easy to follow and use shortcuts, fast piecing techniques and machine appliqué all written for beginners. Ms. Hanson feels that anyone can make her patterns with a little bit of motivation and patience.

She gives another reason for designing for busy women, she is one. She is a college professor by day and a quilt designer by night. Trying to work a full time job and run a business on the side is quite a challenge, so finding a computer program that allowed her to cut her design time in half really appealed to her. EQ7 draws blocks and quilts, colors them in with real fabric, adjusts the size to fit your requirements, and then prints out templates, foundation patterns, rotary cutting charts and fabric yardage! WOW

Workshop Opportunity—Are you Interested?

She also will bring us a lecture on EQ-7 computer program. She

will show and explain this design tool and point out the many programs that can be used. If there is enough interest in a class/workshop [at least 10 or more people] we will arrange for the class on November 17, 2012 at the Country Inn at 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The cost of the class would be \$40.00. You would need a computer and the EQ-7 program to attend. Please call Judy Sellers at 712-366-2454.

NOVEMBER 2012

EQ& Basics – Hands-on workshop where you will learn to use all the tools of EQ7. If you have never seen EQ7 before, it is a computer drawing program for designing quilts and quilt blocks. Working on a laptop with EQ installed, you will learn the logic of the program, the powerful drawing and designing tools, and the printing features needed to make your idea a reality. We will examine all the layers of working with pieced, appliqué, and quilt stencils, as well as techniques for using color and fabric. We can't do it all in this workshop but you will gain the confidence to use the program and the motivation to continue to "play" and learn.

completed quilt, we talk to a quilting friend who

encourages us with 'just try it, it's no big deal, it's just one block – you can make a wall hanging'. But that one block leads to more and the need to get a fabric fix takes over our lives. We think we can stop any time we want to but we can't. First it is just a fat quarter or a bundle, a jelly roll, a cute little charm pack, just a little bit of fabric. Before long we are buying by the yard. We tell ourselves we don't need it, we can do without it, but somehow the thought of walking away from the temptation just never comes to fruition. We buy the fabric and head for home.

All of us have our stash of fabric - those pieces of brightly colored and eyecatching patterns that are destined to become a part of our stash. Early fabric hoarders will have contained stashes that are out in the open. Maybe they are artfully displayed in the sewing room or filling a basket near their favorite chair. Then, when the stash starts to get larger and the looks from family and friends makes us edgy, we get creative with our stash. Sure, we leave out some fabric so that we don't get asked too many questions, but we find odd places to hide the over abundance. Who of us haven't 'lined' the bottom of our sock drawer with a yard or two of Aunt Gracie. Or rolled up a yard of batik and stuffed it in our winter boots in the bottom of our closet. Or hidden a stash under mattresses and beneath cushions on couches. A true fabricaholic will have creative and resourceful ways of containing a stash. Don't travel much - the trunk of a car has lots of storage room. Store it in a box marked Christmas decorations. Camouflage it in a laundry basket with a layer of clothes on top. Fold it like the towels and put it in the bottom of the linen closet. Ask an unsuspecting friend to 'hold it' for you for a while.

As with all such maladies, there is hope. In a future article we will explore the Quilters' 12-step program.

Webmaster Tips of the Month

This month's Tip #1 is an oldie but goodie.

Did you know that you can save a picture, logo or any graphic from the internet (unless it is copyright protected)? Simply right-click your mouse on the

image and select "SAVE AS" from the drop down menu. That will open a window to your files so you can select a place to put it. You can name it whatever you want but leave everything after the "dot" the same. If it is ".jpg" or ".png", it must stay the same. That "extension" tells the computer what program to use to open the file. Easy Peasy.

finished quilt a lot of hands have to touch that one quilt.

When you are in your *library of fabric* – remember the January sew-in will be using 2 1/2 strips. I will have two samples on display at the November guild meeting.

Another sample on display at the guild meeting uses 3 coordinating fabrics in 1 yard cuts. When you are going through your *library of fabric* and you find 2 coordinating fabrics and you

do not have a pattern in mind -- bring the 2 coordinating fabrics to the guild meeting. Helping Hands will find the third fabric.

If you are not sure when the Helping Hands meet – give me a call me first. Sometimes Helping Hands meet at Millard or South Omaha Library.

Past President Susie Jarosz opened the meeting at 7:00 pm. Attendees: Susie Jarosz, Linda Holman, Denise Shroyer, Jan Fry, Connie Pratt, Judie Sellers, Carla Toczek, Angie Reed, Carol McCann, Andrea Chakravarti, Roberta Willet, and Pat Sears.

OFFICER'S REPORTS:

President Elect: Carla Toczek is working on firming up a maker for next year's opportunity quilt.

Treasurer's Report: Denise Shroyer has opened a safe deposit box for the guild's records.

Programs: Judy Sellers reported that Scott Flanigan will lecture and provide a trunk show at the October guild meeting. Reeze Hanson, November's speaker on the EQ7, could come back on Saturday, November 17th to do a class if there was enough interest. Those interested people would need to bring a laptop computer and have the EQ7 software. Judy requests to have set prices for workshops; with suggested rates of \$35 for half days and \$45 for full days. This will be brought up with Corinne Mittag, President. It was brought to attention of the board that the members need to be made aware of the costs for bringing in a speaker.

Correspondence: Terry Palson, who won a blue ribbon at the State Fair, sent a thank you note to our guild thanking us for her prize check.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Bus Trip: Jan Fry reported that they have a full bus and are looking forward to the trip.

Spring Fling: Denise O'Toole, not present,

but it has been reported that the dates have been set for February $15^{\rm th}$ thru $17^{\rm th}$ in 2013.

Newsletter: Elaine Seier, not present, but reported that the issue has been e-published and heading to the printer.

- Use any mixed media technique as long as it includes fabric.
- You are encouraged to add embellishments and try techniques that you haven't tried before.

The charm squares are now available for purchase at the meeting or just simply get in touch with Yvonne Wilson. The envelope cost is \$1.00.

Here are the requirements for this special challenge:

- It must be no smaller than 12"x12", no bigger than 20"x20"
- It must include at least 1 two inch pinwheel
- And you must use a polka dot, stripe and check (plaid is interchangeable for check)



It must include pieces of the fabric that you purchase from the challenge committee for this challenge. Please remember to either take a picture of the charm square fabric or include a piece of the fabric on the back of the quilt or entry form at the Quilt Show.

THE OMAHA QUILTERS' GUILD ADVERTISING POLICY

- All advertising must be directly related to quilting, quilting education and/or products or services related to quilting/sewing. Quilt
 related activities of other guilds and/or related organization will be listed as space permits.
- All advertisements must be submitted to the newsletter editor and approved by the executive board members. Once approved, the ad will be posted in the next available newsletter. The editor/board reserves the right to refuse advertisements at its discretion.
- Advertisements will be limited to a 3.5" x 2" size.
- Fees to place an advertisement in the newsletter will be reasonable and determined by the executive board for the current fiscal year.
- Members who wish to bring flyers advertising quilting or other events to meetings may place their flyers at the membership table (as space permits). These may not be distributed in the meeting room, or on the chairs, and must be removed from the membership table at the end of the evening. Flyers may not be placed on vehicles in parking lots at OQG events. Any flyers not picked up at the end of the night will be disposed of.
- No announcements or advertisements may be made during the meeting without prior approval from the President. The only exception
 to this policy is if another guild or nonprofit group is selling tickets on a quilt, in which case the quilt may be shown during the
 Celebration of Quilting portion of the program, with an announcement that tickets are available.
- No individual or group shall be allowed to sell any merchandise or service in the confines of the space leased for meetings/shows/ workshops by the OQG during such events. The only exception to this policy is speakers/teachers who have made arrangements to have their merchandise for sale to OQG members and guests.
