



Quilt Show-June 2013

The Bee Creek Quilting Company came into being in the year 2000, largely by accident. The woman who started the company, Kandi Paige Gallup, fell into design

work for the second time as a fluke - just like the first time.

The first time was in 1976 when she suddenly found herself a professional dressmaker at the age of 16. Sewing was in her blood from many generations back in both her mother and father's family history. She began at the age of 8 with just a needle and thread, attempting to make a skirt for her Penny Bright doll. A year or so later in the Girl Scouts, a wonderful woman, Mary Barnett Ramirez, would again put a needle and thread in her hands and, with great patience, teach a little chatty girl how to make even stitches. Later, in junior high and again in high school, she would be blessed with outstanding sewing and tailoring teachers who loved what they did and were generous with their time and talents. One of those teachers in particular, Mrs. Monte Thompson, was highly skilled and knowledgeable herself. It was during that year of high school when an English teacher tore a hem in her skirt, came into the sewing classroom to fix it and saw Kandi's work hanging on display. She called Kandi at home that evening and hired Kandi to

sew professionally for her. Kandi had her own business as a dressmaker and designer for the next 12 years.

In 1996, Kandi began to quilt. It was a hobby to amuse herself when she left her current career as a cosmetologist to stay at home with her children. After only one year of quilting, she would begin making her own designs, unable to find patterns on the market for exactly what she wanted.

The design work began with the stained glass banners you see on this website. Kandi, being a quilter, wanted a "quilt-y" type item to hang on the front door, one for each holiday season, to greet people. The first design was for Christmas: Joystar, with the Star of Bethlehem. A few months later, Hope for Easter. The other women in Kandi's mini-group saw the banners and wanted to know where they could get the pattern. Later at the guild she belonged to, other women were interested in the patterns, too. Then "Whoops?", the Bee Creek Quilting Company was born.

Bee Creek is a small creek that runs through farm land that has been in Kandi's family for over 100 years. Kandi's father and uncle were born on that land, and her aunt and uncle live there still. If you are ever on Interstate 29 between Kansas City and St. Joseph in Missouri, you'll cross Bee Creek twice.

Message from a Member

My Guild

I saw a quote not too long ago that caught my attention:

There's a difference between interest and commitment. When you're interested in doing something, you do it only when it's convenient. When you're committed to something, you accept no excuses; only results.

My first thought was 'Hmmm, that's why I don't exercise like I'm supposed to!' I'm interested in staying fit, but I'm not really committed to carving out 30 minutes a day to walking and lifting weights.' Now it's possible that my first thought after reading this quote was 'exercise' because there was a runner in the picture next to the quote; and also because in the back of my head I'm always telling myself, 'Get off your tush and go walk! One foot in front of the other, how hard can it be?! Do it! Do it!' But I hardly ever listen to me...okay, not true. I listen to me when me says, 'Go eat chocolate.' Now I know why, because I'm <u>interested</u> in being fit, but I'm committed to chocolate! Since I'd been to a guild meeting about the time this quote crossed my desk, my second thought was where does my quilt guild fit? (Go ahead; read it again, it's very profound!) <u>Interest</u> or <u>commitment</u>?

Do I make time or do I only do it when it's convenient?

I have as many excuses as the next person for not committing to leading a guild committee. I work full time and travel one or two weeks a month for work, I have six grandchildren under the age of 10, and I have a man in my life. I'm committed to all, but I LOVE quilts! I LOVE quilting! Since I joined in 1994 I have made more friends than I can count, heard inspiring speakers, been a part of phenomenal quilt shows, been coerced and prodded into challenging projects (thank you my beloved Material Girls!), and I can't imagine life without this steady flow of inspiration and encouragement. Am I committed to my quilt guild? Why yes, I said to me. I show up every second Tuesday to the guild meeting (when I'm in town), I buy raffle tickets, I take 3 days off to help at the quilt show, some years I even have a quilt in the show, and if someone needs a hand with something, I'll do my best to pitch

But the more I thought about it the more I realized, that's not enough and I'm not nearly as involved as I was when I first joined. Every Tuesday guild night Joan Schoof and I were the holders for each speaker. We did that for like six years straight! I did Block Exchange with another guild member. I did a lot more for my guild back then. I understand

what happened, life happened. I got sidetracked with events in my life, but I never quite got back on track. In the email survey that the board sent out about what I want from/for my guild, it had a question that caught me off guard: 'How many hours a month are you able to contribute?' Hours? A month? I never thought of it that way! I know showing up for guild meetings is supportive. but could I actually carve out, commit, time each month dedicated to a guild activity? Why yes, yes I can!

Almost every committee chair works well with a co-chair and Quilt Show has a number of things that need to be done long before Quilt Show 2013 is brought to life. One very important thing I've learned about the members of this guild is that if you want to do something, but you're not sure what you're doing, there will be someone there to help or provide a little guidance on how to do it. So, take a look at the committees and chat with the people working it this year to see if it's something you'd like to lead or help with next year. Ask how much time it takes them to do the job. Chat with Jan Fry, see what she still needs for Quilt Show 2013, whatever your interest, grab a buddy, get off your tush. Do it! Do it! Commit to your guild!

Challenge Chairperson Yvonne Wilson

Come one, come all and get the charm squares for the Fairy Tales, Folklore and Fables! The charm squares are now available for purchase at the meeting or just simply get in touch with Yvonne Wilson. The envelope cost is \$1.00.

Here are the requirements for this special challenge:

- ► It must be no smaller than 12"x12", no bigger than 20"x20"
- ► It must include at least 1 two inch pinwheel
- And you must use a polka dot, stripe and check
 - (plaid is interchangeable for check)
- ► It must include pieces of the fabric that you purchase from the challenge committee for this challenge.

Please remember to either take a picture of the charm square fabric or include a piece of the fabric on the back of the quilt or entry form at the Quilt Show.

Go ahead! Add your own imagination, love and creativity.

Since we are in the presence of creative quilters in our Guild we offer another challenge:

My Three Words in Fabric

You've watched them on Good Morning, America. I'm sure you've cried and laughed along with us. Now here is your chance to tell us your three words and do it in fabric. What three words can create a look at your life, hopes, thoughts and dreams?

What three words can sum up the best and brightest moment of your life, the funniest moment of your life or the best life has to offer to you.?

How far does your imagination and heart stretch in order to express what is inside of you?

This challenge must meet these requirements:

- ► Your piece must be no smaller than 12"x12" and no larger than 36"x36"
- ▶ Please use three words that catch the essence of what you are trying to convey as your message.
- The letters should be no smaller than 1". Let the size of the quilt be your guide for the largest.
- Use any mixed media technique as long as it includes fabric.
- You are encouraged to add embellishments and try techniques that you haven't tried before.

Make sure that there is a way to hang the quilt up at the show.

OMAHA QUILTERS' GUILD BOARD MEETING February 5, 2013 Lutheran Church of the Master Board Meeting Minutes

President Corinne Mittag opened the meeting at 7:04 pm. Attendees: Linda Holman, Jan Fry, Carla Toczek, Corinne Mittag, Roberta Willet, Denise Shroyer, Andrea Chakravarti, Elaine Seier, Brenda Reid, Judy Sellers, Cheri Vossberg, and Denise O'Toole.

OFFICERS REPORTS:

President Elect: Carla Toczek is working on filling next years board positions, including: Newsletter, Vice President of Programs, President Elect, and Quilt Show Chairman.

Treasurer: Denise Shroyer requests that fees for classes be paid upfront at time of reservations made.

Programs: Judy Sellers reported that only 3 people have signed up for Mindy Smith's class on thread play and free motion quilting, for the Wednesday following the guild meeting. Discussion was held to open up the class to non members, and publicity will go out on face book and the digest. In May, Mary Scott will lecture on Bold Over Batiks, and present how they were processed. Product samples were shown, and will be for sale then. Her costs of lodging and travel will be split with Sioux City's guild, since she will go there following Omaha. Other area guilds will be contacted about sharing Mary Scott's presentation. Also, Judy indicated that she would stay on as Vice President of Programs for next year, and looks forward to a second vice president to assist.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Spring Fling: Denise O'Toole reported that there are 35 reservations, including two in question since haven't returned their reservations with payment. The price is \$125, same as last year. Check in on Friday and check out on Sunday afternoon.

Camp Wannnamakablankie: Cheri Vossberg reported that the 2014 contract has been signed, with a \$2 increase. The retreat will be October 18-20 in 2013, and October 17-19 in 2014. The minimum number of reservations would be for 45 attendees, and need to be in by August 1st. Room rates are as follows:1 person \$276, 2 people \$218, 3 people \$192, 4 people \$170, and 5 people \$148.

Holiday Party: Andrea Chakravarti reported that angel bag items of crocheted hats and hiking items were well accepted. Also the new location at Project Harmony, for the stocking store, went very well. Also the amount of donations we collected was up from the holiday party in December 2011.

Quilt Mom: Angie Reed, not present, but is was reported that the quilt was at the Quilt Studio, and was moving to the West Center location of Country Sampler.

Properties: Andrea Chakravarti will have ready for Mindy Smith, the speaker, two tables upfront and a cart on hand. She will supply her own projector.

Newsletter: Elaine Seier reported that quotes have been obtained from prospective printers to take over where Sir Speedy left off. Currently, she is working with a printer, who is a personal friend and plans to continue thru June. The deadline for articles to be published in the March newsletter is February 15th.

Membership: Brenda Reid reported that two new members have been added to the total number of 265 members. She will mail out some directories to those who have requested them.

Quilt Show: Jan Fry reported that one third of the contracts for venders spaces have been committed for. Publicity has been set up for the Nebraska Country Register. Beverly Fine has been chosen as the judge. A location for judging and quilt turn in is still being determined: Cindy Erickson is looking into this. Dates to remember are as follows:

April 9 is the deadline for quilt entry registration forms

June 7 thru 12 is quilt drop off time
June 17-18 the quilts will be judged
June 20 the quilt show will open

Webmaster: Roberta Willet reported she is

needing the graphics for Block Exchange. The quilt entry form for the show is almost completed, and will go into the data base.

OLD BUSINESS:

Brenda Reid has committed to taking on the webmaster position from Roberta for next year.

The Community Connections chairman position is still open.

At the guild meeting, the small group Gone to Pieces will serve as the welcoming ambassadors.

Jan Fry is questioning if posters are needed or not to advertise the show; and quotes from local printers are being looked into. It was mentioned that the bookmarks are going over well at 11 local shops.

A second Vice President of Programs is needed to assist Judy Sellers; and Carla Toczek is inquiring.

A decision was made to not continue researching on a scholarship or grant for the purpose of restoring the guild's achieves.

NEW BUSINESS:

The Nebraska State Guild has inquired if they can show and sell tickets for their quilt at the April guild meeting, and at the show. Decision was made that they can show their quilt, but not sell tickets at the April meeting.

Accuquilt wants to inform the members that they can make a block at their location to go towards a Make a Quilt Campaign to support a worthy cause.

Nellie from Shakespeare on the Green will speak at the guild meeting requesting assistance for their upcoming season quilts.

President, Corinne Mittag emailed to the board an assembled draft of a survey for presenting to the guild members. It was reviewed and discussed. It was mentioned about the importance of the revenue from the raffle quilt and show, to apply towards costs of national, regional, and local speakers. The board feels as though the members need to be educated on this

matter. The reason for doing the survey, is because the board wants to meet the members interest and needs. Corinne will revise the survey to make easy for the guild members responses. It will be published by hard copy and on line. Also, the members will be informed in March of the results.

A motions was made and seconded to adjourn the meting at 8:37 pm

BUSINESS MEETING:

The minutes from the February newsletter were approved and seconded as published. President Elect: Carla Toczek is seeking members interested in serving on the 2013 -2014 board.

The Opportunity Quilt won in a Cover Contest, and will be featured in the Midwest Directory; plus the guild will get free advertising for the show. More information can be found on the Digest.

Accuquilt has brochures, plus kits available to create blocks to be assembled in a quilt for the Heart Association.

The small group, Gone to Pieces was recognized and thanked for serving as Ambassadors for the evening.

A survey has been assembled and emailed to members, with a few hard copies printed and to be published in the newsletter; and the board is very interested in the members' feedback.

Guest Speakers:

Nellie from Shakespeare on the Green informed members how they can participate with available blocks, to be created into quilted items to be used for the upcoming season from June 20th to July 11th.

Sue McKee invited our guild members to join in on a Mystery Trip thru lowa for April 12th and 13th. Registration forms are available. Pick up locations are in Lincoln and Plattsmouth. The trip includes lunch, dinner, hotel room, and stopping at 9 shops.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Membership: Brenda Reid reported that there were 111 in attendance, which included 9 guests (some from Modern Quilters), and 7 new and returning members. Door prizes were interspersed.

Programs: Judy Sellers informed about the speaker for March: Kandi Gallup will lecture on Precision Appliqué, and give a class on the Saturday following the meeting, starting at 9:00 am with a cost of \$40.

Quilt Show: Jan Fry reported that the quilt entry forms will be in the March newsletter and on the website, and need to be submitted by April 19th (preferably electronically). They are looking to have the quilts dropped off at a private home from June 7th thru 12th. The small group, Hand Maidens are organizing a hand quilting award.

The committee's next meeting will be in March following the guild meeting, and to be announced.

Challenge: Yvonne Wolsmann reported that fabric for the Fairy Tale challenge is now available. The 3 Words Contest challenge will have the regulations published.

Spring Fling: Denise O'Toole reported that with the theme Monster Stash, a pattern to make a stash bag, which hangs from an embroidery hoop, will be available for the 33 attendees. Check in opens at 2:00 pm on Friday February 15th.

Home of the Brave: Windy Benigno reported that they have quilts needing to be bound, and blocks to complete.

Block Exchange had 3 winners from those who turned in blocks.

CELEBRATION OF QUILTS:

Along with those quilts shared, Dee Acklie with a student from College of St. Mary showed their quilt and were selling raffle tickets to support their choirs trip fundraiser to Kansas City.

Judy Seller introduced Mindy Smith, who lectured on Discover Your Creative Power.





We will start taking signups for volunteer shifts at the April meeting. If you know that you cannot work at the show, contact a chairman to volunteer for pre-show work to cover your obligation (2 hours per entry.) These jobs go quickly so please don't delay. Similarly if you know you need a job that allows you to sit, sign up early.

The vendor mall is about 1/3 full as

of this writing. If you're out and about town shopping, drop some hints with your favorite local merchants that you hope to see them at the show. Remind them to go to the website to apply to vend.

We are looking for donations of small quilts-baby quilts, throws, wall hangings, table runners, etc- for the Little Quilt Auction.

Please consider making a donation. The funds from the Little Quilt auction go to support all the programs of the guild. If you have a donation, please contact Nancy Mills. We would love to know about your donation early so that we could include pictures on the website .

QUILT SHOW ENTRY INSTRUCTIONS

Please read carefully before completing entry form!! A separate form must be completed for each item entered. **PLEASE PRINT** all information. Make additional copies of the entry form as required. Completed entry forms must be received by the quilt show co-chairman **no later than April 19**, **2013**. DO NOT TURN IN QUILTS AT THIS TIME. Receipt of entry form by this date allows time for the preparation of the quilt show booklet and planning of exhibits.

ABSOLUTELY NO ENTRY FORMS WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER APRIL 19, 2013!

General Information

Entrant must be a paid member of the Omaha Quilters Guild. All entries must be clean. constructed of fabric and be quilted. Entries may be evaluated, at the entrant's request, by a National Quilting Association (NQA) certified judge. A MAXIMUM of 10 items may be entered for exhibition; a MAXIMUM of 3 of the 10 items may be judged. The challenge quilts do not count as one of the 3 judged entries unless you also indicate that you want this item judged by the NQA judge. Quilts should be clean, smoke and odor free. We reserve the right not to exhibit quilts that do not meet these standards. If an item is judged, entrant will receive a written evaluation form after the close of the show. Ribbon awards are given at the discretion of the judge.

Items which have been exhibited or judged in a previous Omaha Quilters Guild show may not be entered. All entries to be JUDGED must be the work of the entrant, EXCEPT in the case of professionally quilted quilts and group quilts. Only items quilted by OQG members are eligible for the Best of Show award. Items which are not the work of the entrant may be entered for exhibit only.

The judge reserves the right to disqualify any item not meeting published criteria. No special hanging or handling will be allowed. If you wish to make comments to the judge, they should answer questions regarding the technique, and need to be attached to the entry form. (Make a copy for yourself.)

Description of Technique

Pieced: Entry contains hand or machine piecing. Small amount of other techniques permitted.

Appliquéd: Entry contains hand or machine appliqué. Small amount of other techniques permitted.

Mixed: Entry is constructed using a substantial amount of two or more techniques, such as appliqué and piecing. It doesn't included quilting and trapunto. Please describe technique.

Kit and BOM: Where fabric and patterns are specified and sold as a package. If you select the fabric it is NOT considered a Kit or BOM.

Other: Entry is constructed using one special technique such as whole cloth, stenciled, shadow, appliqué, embroidered etc. Please describe technique.

Box 1-Entry Category: Select 1

All entries will be exhibited and/or judged by category. Each entry can be entered in ONLY ONE category. Quilt show chairman reserves the right to move entries to a more appropriate category for judging.

Bed Quilt: Quilt intended for use on a bed. The minimum size is 60" wide x 72" long and is generally traditional.

Wall Quilts/Throws: Quilt intended for wall display or use as a throw and is generally traditional.

Innovative Art: A unique and/or original interpretation (any size). Crib/Baby Quilt: Quilt intended for use by a baby or child. Miniature: Small version of a large quilt. It must be in scale.

Maximum size is 24" by 24".

Clothing: Any pieced or appliquéd, and quilted, garment.

Professional Quilted: Quilted by a professional for hire, by hand or by machine. Write the name of the company (or individual) on the entry form in the appropriate space.

Group Quilt: The entry is made by two or more people. Entry must be made under the name of the owner OR the name of the individual in charge of the project. This category does not include professional (for hire) quilted quilts.

Other: Dolls, tablecloth, tree skirt, totes, crazy quilts etc. Please describe item in appropriate space on the entry form. Note: Dolls will not be judged.

Box 2- Quilting: Select 1 and fill in the name of quilter

Machine Quilted: Entry contains machine quilting and may include some hand quilting.

Hand Quilted: Must be quilted entirely by hand.

Professionally Quilted: Quilter was paid to quilt by hand or

Challenge: Refer to challenge information on the webpage.

Box 3-Additional Information: Check All that apply

First Quilt Show Entry: First Quilt Show Entry (ever).

Holiday Theme: Entry represents holiday theme (Christmas,

Halloween, etc.)

Scrap Quilt: Must contain a minimum of 50 different fabrics, excluding backing fabric(s).

Show Theme: "Polka Dots, Checks and Stripes! Oh My!"

Upcoming Symposium Explores Context, Meaning—April 26-27, 2013

LINCOLN, NE — Quilts hold myriad meanings, a theme that will be explored in the International Quilt Study Center & Museum's sixth biennial symposium in Lincoln, Neb., April 26-27.

"Quilts In Context: The Making of Meaning," will offer attendees an understanding of the circumstances and settings in which quilts were made and used.

"By examining American quilts in their shared contexts within their domestic settings, juxtaposed with fashionable dress and furnishings of the periods, symposium participants will gain a deeper understanding of the people who made, used and cherished quilts for the past 200 years," said Patricia Crews, Willa Cather professor of textiles and IQSCM director.

The program will feature tie-ins to museum exhibitions, including "Posing with Patchwork: Quilts in Photographs, 1855-1955" and "Perfecting the Past: Colonial Revival Quilts."

In addition, special presentations and tours will be provided by Janet Finley, author of *Quilts in Everyday Life, 1855-1955: A 100-Year Photographic History* and Don Beld, founder of the Home of the Brave Quilt Project, a group of volunteers who make quilts for families of fallen service members – quilts inspired by those made during the American Civil War.

Attendees will participate in curator-led tours of the latest exhibitions and a behind-the-scenes tour of the museum.

Registration fees are \$125 for museum members and \$170 for non-members. Fees cover all lectures, tours, special sessions, an informal fashion show featuring designs by UNL Apparel Design students, receptions, coffee breaks and luncheons.
